Noble County remains at the forefront of advancing support for people with developmental differences, and 2024 was no exception. A landmark achievement this year was the appointment of Shelly Miller- an individual with lived experience - to the Noble County Board of Directors, reinforcing our commitment to inclusive leadership.

Additionally, through our alliance with the Belmont and Harrison County Boards, we secured over \$900,000 in grant funding. This critical investment allowed us to expand early intervention services, strengthen community partnerships, and enhance support for direct support professionals – those who empower individuals to live, learn, work, and contribute to their communities.

We value our community partners and our shared commitment to caring for the people we serve. By working hand in hand with the Noble County Department of Job & Family Services and the Mental Health & Recovery Services Board, we were able to welcome a full-time Family & Children

First Council Coordinator. This partnership is one way we're building a stronger, more connected community and improving services.

Supports Coordinated and Funded by your County Board

Early Intervention

Your County Board supports families of those from birth to three with developmental delays and disabilities by teaching them ways to help their little ones learn and grow.

Supports for Adults

People who are 22 and older receive what they need, including in-home supports, employment, day programs, transportation, housing, equipment, supplies, and assistive technology.

Supports for Children

Your County Board funds in-home supports, respite, adaptive equipment and supplies for children. We also provide grants to the public schools and ESC for school age children.

Tomorrow's Youth Project

Children and teens facing behavioral and other challenges benefit from a team approach that includes planned respite, in-home supports, mental health counseling, and therapeutic mentoring.
